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Suburb battle gets pointed



 North Coogee supporters gathered more than 300 signatures opposed to the name change, but say their posters with Q-codes kept getting ripped down.

A GROUP of North Coogee residents hoping to block a proposed name change for their suburb have gathered a 300-strong petition, saying it shows a rival group's choice is too divisive.

In December last year Cockburn council submitted a proposal to the state's Geographic Names Committee to split North Coogee in two, with the northern half to be renamed Catherine Point and the southern half Port Coogee.

The name change is backed by the Catherine Point Community Group, after an initial bid to be known as South Beach was knocked back by the committee in 2021.

But resident Kereth Harris says while the CPCG consulted widely about becoming South Beach, it was strangely silent about moving to plan B.

"Residents signing the petition are angry they

haven't been told about this," Ms Kereth said. 'This is about our identity and we don't relate to the Catherine name.' Ms Harris says how the

point - these days little more than a groyne - got its name seems to have been lost in time, but it harked back to the state's colonisation and that didn't sit well with her supporters.

Roadblocks

"Coogee is an Indigenous name, and it's one of the most beautiful suburbs, really connected and social," she said. "But this name change

has created this great division.'

Ms Harris says she tried to reach out to the CPCG to discuss the issue, but faced roadblocks

"We've had our posters with the QR code pulled down, and Facebook posts have been altered and blocked.'

Ms Harris says a submission from CPCG to the council suggesting

Catherine Point was riddled with "hyperbole" and said the council should have done more factchecking before contacting the Geographic Names Committee.

'Cockburn appear to have been hoodwinked by the Catherine Point group - the group said they speak for all of us in North Coogee and this simply is not true."

Ms Harris said the final insult was a sign on Rollinson Road now welcomes people to Catherine Point because of the community group's recent name change, which she acknowledges was

done under the rules of its constitution.

The CPCG issued a statement to the Herald saying it recognised a 300-strong petition demonstrated significant opposition and it had requested more information.

'A petition which includes a significant number of relevant community signatures, demonstrating opposition to the proposal, can potentially represent new and important data for the CPCG committee to consider," the statement said. But the CPCG said

it's done its best to

communicate with residents. That initially came when it decided to change its own name from South Beach when that name was knocked back.

Communicate

"The community group committee then undertook took to try and communicate this proposed community group name change and why this was being considered - via flyer drops, social media, commercial media, email and at community meetings "At the June 2023 community group AGM

this considered community group name change was proposed and voted on, with the proposal being passed."

The CPCG says it seemed obvious that Catherine Point was the most likely name to be accepted by the names committee and with the Port Coogee Community Association it developed a proposal which was submitted with the council.

It says Landgate is likely to make a decision on whether the name change can proceed by June, and after that the whole shebang would have to be sent back out for formal consultation by the City of Cockburn.


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
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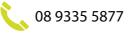
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Trucks creeping back on Hampton

HAMPTON ROAD residents have reignited their battle against heavy vehicles after noticing a rise in container trucks using it as a shortcut to Fremantle Port.

Early this month two makeshift signs appeared on one of Hampton Road's median strips between High Street and South Street, calling for all "CONTAINER TRUCKS <u>OFF</u> HAMPTON RD NOW".

Along with the signs came a notice in letterboxes asking if others had noticed the increase in the number of semi-trailer container trucks and urging them to contact Fremantle council to show the rising community concern.

Sign-makers Rachel and Thierry told the Herald they'd noticed the increase in traffic and container trucks, along with air and noise pollution on Hampton Road, over the past six months.

The couple said they tried opening a dialogue with the council to see if any action could be taken to enforce an existing ban, but weren't thrilled by the response.

After contacting the council, they say they were told to collect "photographic evidence" before the council would take it further.

"It's ludicrous to expect residents to stand in the street photographing container trucks and counting them," Rachel said. The couple requested a

traffic counter instead and while one has not been installed the council told the Herald it was "actively monitoring truck traffic on Hampton Road and is sympathetic to resident concerns. "Hampton Road has a

restriction in place, prohibiting large heavy vehicles from using it as a through-route."

The council says Main Roads enforces breaches of the restriction and it passes on any report from residents

According to Main Roads' website the recommended route for truck drivers is Leach Highway and Stock Road, leading to Stirling Highway which goes directly to Fremantle Port.

Fremantle Ports said the vast majority of truck drivers were professional and used the MRWA-recommended routes to keep locals on-side.

"We find a very small

percentage of container trucks use Hampton Road and those that do are generally servicing the businesses in the local area," Fremantle Ports spokesperson Neil Stanbury said.

Friends of Hampton and Ord founder Julie Murphy says she has repeatedly raised the health, safety and pollution issues with the council since 2016.

"Hampton is no different than any other [residential] street in Perth," Ms Murphy said, noting there are several schools along Hampton and many pedestrians using it each day.

Crosswalk attendant Chris Maston recently suffered multiple broken bones after being hit by a speeding car while ushering Fremantle Primary School students across the road.

Mr Maston now says he "wouldn't even walk his dog across Hampton Road".

While a container truck was not at the root of the incident, Mr Maston points out that "quite a few" are using Hampton Rd, adding to an unsafe

environment.

Road to Rail Campaign founder Barry Healy believes it is "insanity to have heavyduty trucks driving through the suburban streets of Fremantle".

Road to Rail started in 2010, calling for more use of rail as the "least environmentally destructive" alternative to get goods to the port.

Mr Healy says that if the public were aware of the severity of the health damage diesel trucks could cause, including lung cancer from a fug of particulates, it would become the "Achilles heel" for WA's Environmental Protection Authority.

The former McGowan government proposed the new Outer Harbour in Kwinana as a way of reducing truck traffic in Fremantle and Melville, but Mr Healy and the Road to Rail campaign say they are "heavily against the idea of moving the problem, rather than solving it' and want to see more investment in rail

Are you sophisticated?

I asked you whether you are sophisticated, what would your answer be? You might say that's it's all about smoking, drinking, never thinking of tomorrow, nonchalant, diamonds shining, dancing, dining with some man in a restaurant. Great answer, especially if you're a sophisticated lady like Ella Fitzgerald.

Or you might answer that it's about having \$2.5 million in the bank and \$250,000 in gross income. Not quite as romantic, but an equally good answer, particularly if you want to access potentially lucrative wholesale investments.


That's what you currently need under the Corporations Act to qualify as a "sophisticated investor" - \$250k of gross income in each of the two previous financial years and \$2.5m in net assets, including the family home, super and controlled entities. The second problem is that having a bit of wealth does not make you Warren Buffett. I've met pecunious persons who are more at home at an all-you-can-eat buffet than dancing and dining in fine restaurants, never mind making decisions about complex and substantial investments.

Fortunately the government is finally reviewing the sophisticated investor rules. This week a parliamentary joint committee inquiry was commenced to consider the wholesale investor tests, with written submissions due 15 May 2024.

Media has speculated an increase to the net assets test from \$2.5m to \$4.5m, although Minister Stephen Jones denies that any decision has been made. It's estimated that raising the threshold to \$5m would bring the number of sophisticated households back to 3.1%.

Accountants are asked to sign off on sophisticated investor certificates, and before we do so we vigorously check that applicants



Sophisticated investors can be offered investments without many of the consumer protections offered to retail investors – for example, without a prospectus.

There are two major problems with the rules. Firstly, the test thresholds were established in 2001 and at the time resulted in 1.9% of the population being classified as sophisticated investors. Since then property values have risen by about 290%, and we now have a 16% "sophisticated" population, projected to hit 29% by 2031. meet financial eligibility requirements. This is not straight forward since the Corporations Act does not define "gross income" or "net assets", and guidelines around "controlled entities" are somewhat vague. We are not asked to assess other factors like experience, investment suitability, competence, smoking, drinking and thinking about tomorrow. The certified applicant might have received an inheritance yesterday, having never before owned an investment. It's not the funnest job for busy accountants and is an insurance claim waiting to happen if an investment goes bad - not because accountants

have done anything wrong, but because professional indemnity insurance is an easy target for a sophisticated plaintiff.

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Who's got friendly?

COCKBURN is set to become officially "owl friendly".

The council has adopted BirdLife Australia's Action Kit to protect the city's threatened owl population. As part of the scheme,

the council will encourage residents to steer away from rodenticides which can kill owls via second-hand ingestion.

Currently, second generation anticoagulant rodenticides are the most popular and effective method to kill rats and mice, but they are so strong they can be fatal to any animal who ingests the poisoned rodents.

There can be a significant lag between ingesting an SGAR bait and death, giving owls ample time to hunt the rodents and die from second-hand poisoning.

Cockburn councillor Phoebe Corke flagged the move back in February and says it is vital councils do what they can to minimise the "horrendous effects" of SGARs.

"It's slightly more expensive to get the first-generation baits or traps as a way of killing the vermin," Cr Corke said.

"But if it's going to save the owls, it's got to be done, it's a

no-brainer/

Cr Corke hopes to see SGARs off the Australian market soon, following in the footsteps of other countries in Europe and North America.

"There's so much evidence about the widespread impact on wildlife and damage that they're doing," Cr Corke said. "We're trying to get the

other member councils of the Perth South West Metropolitan Alliance to follow our lead as well.'

Cr Corke, who is the Cockburn representative on the PSWMA's environmental forum, plans to discuss being an owl friendly council at the next meeting and says other council are already enthusiastic.

Cockburn will only use first generation anticoagulant rodenticides on its properties and facilities, though they need to be consumed numerous times before causing death.

But they don't generally kill anything apart from the intended target, meaning wildlife can consume the dead animal relatively safely.

The Council will also continue its use of mouse and rat traps in favour of the second-generation baits, and its contracts with pest control companies will also be altered to include the details of the owl friendly policy.

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Kings Park guru joins surf protest

KINGS PARK'S long-serving director of science has thrown his weight behind a campaign to stop a surf park in Jandakot.

Kingsley Dixon, who's also a professor at Curtin University's School of Molecular and Life Sciences, says Perth's rapidly dwindling banksia bushland is important habitat for the endangered Carnaby's black cockatoo and its protection should be a government priority.

The economic benefits argument should be consigned to history," Prof Dixon said, "because that economic rationalism is what has given us the conservation crisis of today.

"Economics in Western Australia always wins over environment.

As the Herald reported last month, environment minister Reece Whitby acknowledged the bushland's importance but favoured economic benefits the surf park will generate when giving approval for proponent Aventuur to clear the site ("Wave park clears bush hurdle," Herald, March 23, 2024).

Prof Dixon, who has been working at Kings Park for 30 years, said the surf park represents a "death by a thousand cuts" for Western Australia's bushland.

"The government has a responsibility to govern for future generations and to protect the environment," he said.

"Why they're doing it is unclear, but it is out of step with any clear-thinking government.

"Right now is the only time we can make the right decisions for the environment, not next year, not in 10 years.

"Carnaby's cockatoos can't survive in a surf park.'

Prof Dixon's comments come after a conservation group attempting to deliver an open letter to premier Roger Cook were denied entry to Dumas House last week.

The letter was signed by eight conservation group representatives, including the Urban Bushland Council, the WA Forest Alliance, and the Conservation Council of WA

Urban Bushland Council representative Heidi Hardisty slammed the action as "undemocratic", saying the state government had not done its due process by analysing the long-term environmental impact of bulldozing the endangered bushland.

"They have not looked at the value of keeping that bushland and they never do," Ms Hardisty said.

"They're not looking at the cumulative impacts properly, so it's very poor economic evaluation. "In other words, it's simply greed."

Premier Cooke's office was contacted for comment but did not reply in time for publication.

FORMER bouncer and Fremantle Piazza business owner 'Steve' died after a long illness last week.

Described as a "big loss to Freo", his quirky spiritual giftshop Kings of the Sun sold curios such as crystals, sound bowls, incense, and art.

The shop was open for eight years and was a staple of the Piazza, with Steve seeing it through some turbulent issues with crime and violence in the area

Former Fremantle councillor Bill Massey was a friend and described Steve as a "gentle giant" who loved his shop and the people around it.

"The Piazza was Steve's kingdom," Mr Massey said.

"It was Steve's law in here, he kept it clean, he moved on people who were undesirable.

"He also looked after all the other shopkeepers too."

Mr Massey describes Steve as a "complex guy" who was "cautious with his friendships" but a fierce protector of the Piazza - as well as of his surname.

'Not your typical looking businessman but he ran a very successful business.

Fellow business owner Kelly Williamson, who runs Vintage Lily in the Piazza, says Steve's death has "devastated" the Piazza community.

"He made me feel very welcome when I first moved here," Ms Williamson said.

"Everybody in the area is aware of how much he loved this little space

"It meant the world to him."

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Kepert trial drags on

THERE has been another delay in the prolonged trial of former Melville councillor Steve Kepert.

Mr Kepert appeared in the Fremantle Magistrates Court on April 11 for his fourth day of trial, where the department of local government concluded its case against him.

Mr Kepert is facing seven

charges, including five for falling to vote during his single term on council when his relationship with the City,Äôs administration started to fall apart.

He originally faced 36 charges, but 34 were reduced to just five on the first day of trial, after the magistrate ruled he could only be charged once per meeting instead every time he didn, Aôt vote.

That left him with seven charges all up, the remaining

two being for not declaring a financial interest and benefitting from legal support.

The magistrate recognised the frustration Mr Kepert must have had with the case taking so long.

The first complaint against him was logged with the department in 2021, but it took two years before it went to trial.

Two more days of trial have been set for July 3 and September 11, where Mr Kepert can give his defence.

UNIONISTS staged a noisy die-in on Cliff Street on Monday to pressure the Fremantle branch of the Mediterranean Shipping Company to drop an Israeli collaborator.

A handful of police watched as protesters gathered outside MSC's Freo office calling for it to cut ties with ZIM Integrated Shipping Services, an Israeliowned company it signed a collaboration agreement with last year to swap and share vessels and berths.

Rumours have circulated that Zim carried weapons components and white phosphorous for the Israeli Defence Forces for the war in Gaza, though the company's CEO has reportedly denied it.

The local Unionists for Palestine protest was part of a international action by A15 Action who state their aim as to: "Identify and blockade major

choke points in the economy focusing on points of production and circulation with the intention of causing the most economic impact" to Israel.

Protesters in T-shirts covered with fake blood lay surrounded by sacks of flour while others shouted into megaphones in support of Palestine or condemning Israel for what they claim is a genocide.

Intifada

The group shouted support for an "Intifada" or Palestinian uprising against Israeli occupation in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, and for the creation of an independent Palestinian state.

Protests coordinator Michelle Aitken called for all economic ties to Israel to be cut.

Ms Aitken said the flour sacks

referred to an attack in February this year where the IDF fired on civilians rushing towards an aid distribution point, killing more than 100.

She believes the group's protests have raised public awareness and are changing people's perceptions about the war in Gaza, and said further protests are planned for the future.

Similar protests were held around Australia late last year, and Melbourne Sydney and Adelaide ports have again been targeted with blockades and picket lines targeting ZIM.

The *Herald* contacted MSC which declined to comment.

A statement on ZIM's official website from October 15, 2023 remains the same; "despite the war situation in Israel, all local ports, in Ashdod, Haifa and Eilat, are operating as usual."

BACK TO BLACK, a new movie by director Sam Taylor-Johnson, follows the short and tumultuous journey of Amy Winehouse, immersing viewers in the highs and lows of her life through her own eyes.

Central to Winehouse's story is her passionate yet destructive relationship with Blake, (Jack O'Connell), a love that veered into darkness despite her initial infatuation.

NEW movie of stark contrast by British film director Johnathon Glaser, the Zone of Interest depicts the lives of a German commandant and his family living next door to Auschwitz.

In the shadows of the barbedwired walls of the horrendous extermination camps, Hedwig and Rudolf Hoss have created a beacon of domesticity and a stunning oasis of a garden for their entertainment and children to play in.

Knowing what we know of the terrible holocaust, it was sickening to see how these seemingly ignorant people went about their normal lives while chimney stacks billowing black smoke and gunshots and screams can be heard from the camp.

The true juxtaposition of these lifestyles is highlighted as Rudolf's love for his wife and children is evident, but his involvement in the systematic extermination and plans to build a bigger crematorium ready for trains of Hungarian Jews cast a pall.

It casts conflict knowing the horrors of Nazi concentration camps and this family living in ignorance.

Hedwig receiving bags from the

servants (prisoners) turns out to be belongings like underwear and fur coat from the prisoners, which she divvies among her family and friends.

I understand these simple treasures of war are converted, but to hear the women talking around the table about the hiding of diamonds by the prisoners in toothpaste evoked such a strong feeling of disgust for me.

A dream sequence in black and white depicts a girl planting fruit in the side of the hills, but it becomes evident that it is actually a night vision of the girl leaving fruit hidden for the prisoners to find.

This was confusing and didn't really fit with the storyline, as it is not clear whether it's a daughter who is out at night or one of the prisoners working in the house.

It is a movie worth seeing, if not for the conflicting emotions but because it tells the story of a different side of family life during the holocaust than we usually see.

The closing scenes are the cleaners going through Auschwitz now, vacuuming and cleaning the windows holding the displays of belongings from victims, ready for visitors, bringing us back to reality. **3.5/5 chickens**

Sonic longbow

THE cello and the synthesiser seem like odd bedfellows. In fact, I'm struggling to think of a song where they both heavily feature But this makes them the perfect combo for Audible Edge, a three day festival of experimental music in Fremantle and Perth.

The cello in question will be played by Perth muso Sophia Hansen-Knarhoi and the synthesiser by her young partnerin-crime Liam Downey.

They met while studying Music Composition and Technology at WAAPA, where a musical romance soon blossomed.

"He ran up to me in the car park to congratulate me on a presentation I was not so proud of. We hit it off instantly," Hansen-Knarhoi says

"He is the first person I go to for feedback on my solo work, and we've always been on the same page in terms of artistic vision and integrity.

"Liam and I have been great friends for a number of years now."



In her solo work, Hansen-Knarhoi combines her cello playing and soothing voice to create a dreamy tapestry of sound, while Downey is known for his harderhitting electronica. So what will this clash of genres

produce at the festival?

"Although I perform and compose regularly on the cello, I still have a vulnerability with it, as if it's safer when attached to my voice," Hansen-Knarhoi says.

"In this piece I will be examining and pushing that vulnerability, in conjunction with Liam's budding exploration in live electronics and electronic ambience within his work. Our piece explores attention - how we use it and what we give it to.

"The fusion of us as artists is an interesting one – me an ambient folk composer working within minimalism. Liam, a maximalist electronic music producer. We have been finding the common ground in this piece but also highlighting our differences through our approach.'

Hansen-Knarhoi, 24, grew up in Mosman Park and completed the last year of her degree studying in London, while Downey, 23, is a Hillarys lad. They both like

"boundary-pushing, genre-defying" artists like L'Rain, Jenny Hval, Arca, Julia Holter and Kali Malone, as well as artists on the fringe of the mainstream like Cassandra Jenkins.

"We are also continually inspired by the local artists we are surrounded by, many of which are also performing exciting exploratory works in the festival," Hansen-Knarhoi says.

The up-and-coming duo are just one of the experimental bands at this year's Audible Edge, which features a mix of international and local underground performers.

The festival is presented by the Perth label Tone List, who showcase artists outwith the mainstream, and was first held in 2017.

Covid played havoc with the format of the artist-run festival, but it's back with a bang with a great line-up including Anaxios, Nick Ashwood, Rebecca Lloyd-Jones and Ayo Busari.

South of the river, the festival will be held at venues including the Flaming Galah, PS Art Space, and Sullivan Hall in White Gum Valley.

Perth venues include the State Library of WA, The Bird, Local and Aesthetic, and Astral Weeks.

"It's a three-day long party where you're invited to listen, dance, cry, ask questions, be moved, move, meet new people, arrive at new discoveries, get wild and get weird," says Audible Edge co-curator Annika Moses.


'Instead of party bags you leave with a burgeoning feeling that new ways of listening and being are more than possible; they are probable and within our reach."

Musical freedom

INSPIRED by their theatrical hit *Black Brass* from the 2021 Perth Festival, Africanborn musicians Mahamudo Selimane and Mararo Wangai have put together a purely musical venture which launches at Clancy's in Fremantle on April 28.

The pair now live in Perth and will release their album Khululeko, which means Freedom in one of the languages of the native Bantu people of southern Africa.

Kenyan-born Wangai, who has forged a name in literary circles and last year was awarded the Maria Pallotta-Chiarolli Fellowship at the WA Centre of Stories, says the album celebrates the unity which music brings.

He says it's a "healing balm, a sound of peace throughout a world full of war, oppression, and indifference.

"Music asks us to feel and connect with our spirits regardless of the languages it is sung in, or the particularities of the bodies

singing it. "Music will always defy borders, divisions and the arbitrary walls that so-called world leaders create.

"Music connects me with my continent, and its history."

The collaborators met in Perth and worked on Wangai's show *Black Brass*, which was centred around music and went on to tour the Sydney Festival and South Africa's Bloemfontein Festival.

Wangai said it was the encouraging feedback from audiences that prompted them to work on a solely musical project, and he acknowledges that Selimane's experience in the industry brought something special to the music.

Selimane is a member of Mozambique's most successful international exports, Eyuphoro, one of the first bands to be picked and promoted by pop icon Peter Gabriel's world music label Real World.

Eyuphoro use traditional rhythms from Mozambique's Nampula province, such as tufo, namhandga, masepua

and djarimane, blended with a cosmopolitan mix of Latin and Arabic styles, reflective of the areas role as a meeting point of cultures.

HERE'S a new bandito in town.

It's not Brad Pettitt wearing a hemp poncho and an upcycled moustache, but a restaurant called Frida Mexicana.

Back in the day, a plate of sizzling fajitas en route to your table would turn heads and was all the rage, but nowadays small tacos (taqueria) are the in-thing.

It's part of a wider movement towards share plates and grazing, with many folk not having the time or inclination to hunker down for a three-course epic.

Along with the stalwart Mexican Kitchen, there's now La Cabana and Gorgeous George, so the Mexican Wave in Freo is slowly turning into a tsunami.

Since opening last year, Frida Mexicana has gone down a storm with locals. Thankfully I booked as it was packed to the gunnels on a Tuesday night during the Easter holidays.

It felt like one of those "in" places and the restaurant was heaving with young couples, families and the odd group of pensioners who wanted to keep things spicy.

There was a lovely alfresco, where you could sit and watch Fremantle in all its ramshackled glory (it was the usual procession of eccentrics, misfits, druggies and boring middle-class families like us). Inside was cosy and rustic, and it felt like a federation house that had been converted into a restaurant.

The menu was divided into botanas (snacks), share plates, burritos, taqueria, bigger plates and desserts.

It was a nice range that covered all the favourites as well as a few surprises like the carne y papas fritas, mango and bocconcini salad, and empanadas.

I was with my wife "Special K" and two young kids, so we decided to order the Feed Me Tacos, which was great value with all nine tacos on the menu for \$69.

Meaty kick

There was also a Frida Platter (\$90) with totopos, chicken wings, ceviche tostadas, empanadas, mango and rocket salad, quesadilla and dessert.

It was very busy and Frida pride themselves on making their fresh meals from scratch, so there was a bit of a wait, but it came just in time before my kids started stabbing each other with the cutlery.

Frida hand't skimped on the toppings and there was a yummy kaleidoscope of colours and textures, almost like an impromptu artwork, with everything from pumpkin calabaza rostizada to lamb barbacoa.

Out of the meat ones, the beef carnitas was particularly enjoyable with an intense flavour kick from the 12-hour slow cooked beef and accompanying cheese, chipotle mayo and coriander.

Coming a close second was the carne asada with perfectly cooked flank steak and some nice cheese, chinichurri and Spanish onion.

The veggie tacos weren't just there to make up the numbers and the fried eggplant was very enjoyable – a moreish mix of panko crumbed eggplant, pickled cabbage, chipolte mayo and ricotta salata cheese.

For good measure, there was a couple of seafood numbers and the tacos de camaron was my favourite from the whole meal.

A delightful combo of lettuce, prawns, avocado and tomatillo salsa. Often prawns can be like rubber bullets in Mexican dishes, but these were plump and juicy.

My wife enjoyed the baja taco with battered fish, slaw, lime mayo and pico de gallo.

The only one that didn't work for me was the roasted pumpkin, which was left on the plate after everyone had a tentative nibble.

The tacos were super filling and probably another small side would have been enough, but we had ordered the nachos bravos (\$20 plus beef \$6).

These were sophisticated, almost deconstructed nachos with the pulled beef seperate from the corn chips, melted cheese, gucamole, salsa, pico de gallo soucram and jalpenos.

Maybe I'm old school, but it was too perfect and I wanted an



industrial slag heap of nachos that collapsed into a satisfying, messy whole. The ingredients were good quality, but there wasn't that trademark flavour punch.

As I reached for my Rennies, I glanced up and saw a portrait of Frida Kahlo on the wall, the Mexican painter the restaurant was named after.

There was some nice design touches and it's no surprise the place is run by the same folk who own the popular Sana and Sandrino next door. While lacking the refinement of the tacos at La Cabana, Frida Mexicana serves up big bold flavours with high quality ingredients, has more choice, and is well priced (especially the "Feed Me").

There's a lively buzz to the venue and it's a good shout for a fun casual meal when you're out in Freo.



ignificant changes to residential Ctenancy laws passed through Oparliament this week heralding a strengthening of tenants rights as they relate to residential leases. The following key changes will impact residential tenancies:

- 1. Tenants will be allowed to keep pets and the property owner will only be able to refuse in certain circumstances.
- 2 Tenants will be able to make minor modifications to the property without permission from the owner.
- 3. Tenants may take an owner to court if they can demonstrate the owner has acted with reciprocity against a tenant.
- Rent increases are limited to 4. once annually.
- The process of bond disposals 5 can be commenced by either tenant or landlord.
- 6. Disputes will mostly be heard by the Commissioner of
- Consumer Protection rather than the Magistrate's Court.
- Rent bidding will be banned. 7.

Overall. the chanaes are moderate and align with tenancies laws in other states and territories. Importantly, the changes stop short prohibiting 'without grounds terminations', a silly phrase used to describe circumstances where a tenant requests a further lease term after the end of a fixed term and the landlord refuses without giving a reason



REIWA conducted a survey into this particular element of the tenancy laws with an astonishing 61 percent of the 6,000-odd landlords surveyed saying they'd 'consider selling' the property if without grounds terminations' were prohibited. Given a fixed term lease has a clear end date, neither party should anticipate that an additional lease or reversion to a 'periodic lease' is assured. You don't have to give a reason to end a fixed term agreement in any other circumstance, even a marriage!

Rent increases are limited to once annually

At a time where supply of rental homes are at crisis point across Australia, new laws that actively undermine the encouragement of supply risks further disincentivizing the main cohort of property investors; unsophisticated, family investors the majority of whom own one additional property other than their home.

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



Masterstroke

FREMANTLE'S Grainne McCabe was so moved by the suffering of children in Gaza that she decided that she wasn't going to let the dual challenges of distance or her

multiple sclerosis get in the way.

Although aware of the pain she would experience, Ms McCabe set herself the incredible feat of rowing 20 kilometres in five days on her rowing machine, along the way earning \$12,000 for a Unicef Gaza relief fund.

Unicef had issued a challenge for people to raise money through an intense physical effort, and Ms McCabe says her compassionate streak compelled her to sign up in the hope of making a difference.

There was some concern from family and friends when they

found she'd signed up that the physical challenge might prove too much, but she pushed through and completed the 20km within the deadline she'd set for herself.

Her family and friends rallied around, helping her on and off the rowing machine after each session as well as supporting her recovery with help around the house during ht eday.

Ms McCabe said she experienced fatigue and pain at the end of each day, her MS regularly flaring during her workouts.

"When we are so far away from the conflict, it is hard to know how to help, but we can always help, by lobbying our government, or raising awareness, and of course, money," Ms McCabe said. After riding the 20km, and with little change in the situation in Gaza, Ms McCabe said her frustration fuelled her determination to ride an additional 15km, further raising awareness and taking her tally up to the \$12,000.

Ms McCabe's money will go towards clean water, food and education supplies in Gaza, where famine and disease have followed the Israeli bombs that have reportedly killed 12,300 children.

[^]Every \$90 is used to craft 18,000 water purification tablets which can purify five litres of clean drinking water, \$160 provides 304 sachets of 'therapeutic' food and \$311 delivers a school box with enough supplies and education to keep 40 children learning.
