No funds for Canning parks

MELVILLE councillors have rejected a design and budget for a contentious park in the Canning Bridge precinct.

The park is one of two that residents are pushing to have developed in the precinct to cater for greatly increased densities, but councillors were concerned about the burden the \$1.7 million price tag would have on ratepayers.

Central Ward councillor Scott Green argued at last Tuesday's monthly meeting the proposed

budget would be better spent elsewhere awhile the land could be utilised for a greater purpose.

"There are better sites for tree-planting than The Esplanade," Cr Green said. "We need much more bang for our buck."

Applecross-Mount Pleasant Ward councillor Clive Ross has been one of the key supporters of the project and says "\$1.7m equates to 38.25 cents for each ratepaying property in the City of Melville".

Cr Ross said that amount would decrease even further if the current level of properties under construction was taken into account

and more people moved in.

He said the City had failed in its obligation to provide public open space within the walkable distance of 400 meters from each resident, estimating more than 700 faced a longer trek to access a bit of nature.

Save Our Space co-administrator Sue Flis told the Herald the decision to reject the motion had fuelled the already raging uproar of residents in the area who were keen to finally have a liveable space with a bit of fresh air.

Earlier this year, more than 2000 people signed a petition asking the council to "go ahead and fund the

park that they'd agreed to create" Ms Flis said.

She says it's understandable the council is pushing for high rise buildings to promote density and combat Perth's sprawl but she hopes councillors pay attention to the value of public amenities as well.

She says the only POS in the City is Apex Park which is bound by a "black-watery swamp" and the "little perimeter border along the banks of the river".

Ms Flis hopes the council will have secured enough funding by the time a review of the park problem is considered at its June meeting.

Tracker helpless as fox feasts on turtle

FOXES have been caught red-handed continuing their attacks on Bibra Lake's vulnerable snake-necked turtles.

Last week while Bibra Lake Turtle Tracker Paul Markendale watched on helplessly from the shore, a fox dug up two aestivating (hibernating) turtles in the middle of the lake and devoured what they could.

It follows the trackers' discovery earlier this month of 96 turtle carcasses which showed signs of being attacked by the feral pests ("Foxes blamed for turtle deaths," Herald, May 4, 2024).

Bibra Lake Turtle Trackers co-ordinator Joyce Gadalon told the Herald it was depressing to pass World Turtle Day on May 24 with the prospect of the local population being predated out of existence by the foxes.

"Foxes have continued to be sighted at the lake this week as it appears the

City is unable to stop turtle death from happening," Ms Gadalon said.

"Save Our Snake-Necked Turtles recovered an additional nine turtle carcasses from the lake bed last week and a further five carcasses were found by turtle trackers in bushland surrounding the lake at the same time."

Ms Gadalon said other than Mr Markendale's encounter, trackers had sighted two other foxes around the lake during May. "There are now questions being raised on whether the council are meeting their obligations of controlling foxes under WA's Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007 which requires all land owners and managers to control foxes found on their land," she said.

"Bibra Turtle Trackers are frustrated at the time it has taken local council and government agencies to action welfare checks on the remaining turtles in the lake and whether any more can

be done to protect them."

But Ms Gadalon said a meeting between the trackers and the council prompted by their speaking out had gone well.

Support

She said questions asked by staff showed there was support for the trackers within the council, but they were still finding it hard to generate action.

Meanwhile around

40 community members gathered at the Cockburn Wetlands Centre on World Turtle Day to hold a candlelight vigil for the turtles killed by the foxes, and to write to Federal Labor MP Josh Wilson urging him to support strong new nature laws.

Following a welcome to country by Whadjuk Noongar man Shaun Nannup, turtle tracker Felicity Bairstow addressed the crowd.

"Volunteers have spent hundreds of hours protecting these turtles and their babies, from protecting nesting females and their nests, to calling for feral animal control," Dr Bairstow said.

"But we're up against worsening climate impacts like droughts and heatwaves, and we need our national environment laws to be much stronger in order to protect wildlife."

AT the corner of South Terrace and Nelson St in South Fremantle, two half-painted red-tailed black cockatoos wait patiently.

But neighbours to the cockies have found themselves in a sticky strata situation which has forced their creator to pause her brushes.

And when things get sticky with strata, a disagreement about something like artwork can get a little complicated.

Paul Ryan owns the shop on the corner and commissioned environmental activist and street artist Lora Flora to decorate the big wall opposite Abhi's Bakery.

But while his strata neighbours love Flora's emerging cockies, they're not so keen on a more bohemian mural which graces the front of the building on busy South Terrace.

They were hoping Mr Ryan would tone down the frontage before starting on the cockies, but he's dug in, saying negotiations have taken a formal turn when he'd rather resolve things with a

"friendly chat".

"We're a strata, lots of different people, lots of different opinions," he said.

Meanwhile Flora says she's been caught in the middle of the squabble, and had to stop work on the cockies after a heated exchange with Mr Ryan's neighbours.

A conservation biologist by training, she can't wait to get back to the mural, which she hopes will help raise awareness of the plight of the red-tailed black cockatoos, which are listed as "vulnerable".

A GROUP of Freo artists are being forced to relocate after being given three months' notice to move out by a developer.

The Tiny House Collective, formerly known as the Swan's Nest, sits on the corner of Amherst and Stack Streets in the former McCarthy's Engineering shed.

The Collective facilitated artists and creatives from around Fremantle, offering affordable spaces for painters, woodworkers, sculptors, welders, and boutique construction companies.

However, the site was purchased by Subiaco-based developer Locus in 2021 and is set to be demolished and replaced by the Monument East development later this year.

The Collective was given a three-month eviction notice in March, which gives them until end of June to find somewhere new.

Scrambling

According to some of Freo's creatives, several of whom have called the Collective home, it wasn't enough time.

Artist Laura Folan, also known by her artist name Lora Flora, has previously used the Collective's space for her paintings and says the group had known about development for "quite some time", but that the three-month eviction notice has left some tenants "scrambling".

"There's no similar spaces where there is such a mixture of people doing different things," Ms Folan said.

"We haven't been able to find a warehouse suitable for all of us, so it's like we're breaking off into different directions.

"There's a lot of spread space to do noisy or messy projects, and a lot of art studios are just completely not suitable for that."

Ms Folan says she feels as if she's "losing a support network"

of fellow artists who aren't being made to feel welcome in Freo anymore.

"There's very much a lack of affordable spaces for artists in Fremantle at the moment," she said.

"It really feels like the artists and creatives are being pushed further and further out.

"Fremantle likes to think of itself as an artsy space that supports artists - I'm not seeing a huge amount of that at the moment."

Fremantle Industrial Arts Quarter secretary Gayle O'Leary says artists have been scrambling to find alternative spaces to facilitate their craft in a "hideously unaffordable" market.

"The sad thing is a lot of small businesses and artists who were there before, have already moved out," Ms O'Leary said.

"Some of them have already

shut down their businesses out of fear that they wouldn't be able to find another space to relocate to.

"Hopefully that won't be permanent, but we just don't know."

According to Ms O'Leary, Locus will be retaining the red brick buildings on Stack Street for commercial and creative use, but there is "no guarantee" they will remain affordable for Collective members to utilise.

"One of the reasons why people are attracted to working [at the Collective] is because you've got some breathing space to pursue what you're interested in," Ms O'Leary said.

Flexible

"These spaces are flexible, and even if they've only got a little bit of room, they make it work because they know each other, they work well together, and they can sort of accommodate each other's each other's needs.

"It's not as formalised as a lot of the newer spaces."

Ms O'Leary acknowledged the effort developer Locus had gone to consult the community about Monument East, which is part of the Knutsford East Local Structure Plan to create residential infill.

"We all chipped in and told them what we value about this area and what our fears are and what we don't want it to become," she said.

"That was good, that was open.

"But what they didn't talk about there is the impact that it's having on people within those spaces and how they were how would they manage that."

Cultural centre delay angers Noongar elder

CONSTRUCTION of an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in Bibra Lake has been put on hold to the dismay of some traditional owners who say the delay is “disrespectful”.

The City assigned \$12.5 million to the centre in late 2021 and the construction tender was awarded in 2022.

However, Cockburn acting director of community Anton Lees says the cost of the tender ballooned significantly.

“Due to ongoing high and rising inflation, building costs and interest rates coupled with a tight labour market, the preferred tender submission was more than \$6m higher than the council-endorsed budget,” Mr Lees said.

“As a result, the tender was unable to be awarded.

“An allocation has been included in the draft 2024-25 Annual Municipal Budget to finalise the centre’s design and commence construction.”

The centre was designed to be a “place of recognition and

learning” for local Noongar culture, and a “safe and secure meeting place” for Aboriginal people.

Its construction is part of the City’s Reconciliation Action Plan and was developed with input from the Cockburn Aboriginal Reference Group.

However, some members of the Cockburn Indigenous community are less than happy with the “disrespectful” postponement.

Elder and former Reference Group member Corina Abraham says the council needs to be

“held accountable” for the delay given its significance to the area’s Indigenous community.

“We’ve done all this consultation, we’ve done all this work around it, and they just seem to keep disrespecting my people as the Aboriginal community in regard to the cultural centre,” Ms Abraham said.

“We’ve fought for so many years and we haven’t even got the concrete slab down.

“You’ve got the wave put in place and you’ve got other things put in place and yet the cultural centre is supposed to be built now.

“It keeps getting pushed back.”

Ms Abraham, who was on the ARG before she says she was “ostracised” and removed from the panel, is seriously ill and on palliative care, and is not hopeful she’ll see the centre constructed while she’s still alive.

“We’re never going to see what we fought and consulted and advocated for, for many, many years,” she said.

“It feels like it’s never going to be built.”

Borer a pandemic

FEDERAL Perth Labor MP Patrick Gorman (right) has labelled a tiny beetle as a “pandemic” for Perth trees.

In Parliament this week, Mr Gorman said the polyphagous shot-hole borer was an “enemy” that posed a massive biosecurity risk to the country.

“This invasive beetle is just two millimetres long and it’s on a rampage from Fremantle to Perth and a number of suburbs in between,” Mr Gorman said.

Chopped

“Already I’m seeing in my electorate trees in people’s backyards being chopped to the ground.

“In Hyde Park, a loved Perth park in the middle of our city, we’re looking at some hundreds of trees being removed.

“Sadly, Kings Park and its trees that have outlived the Bond Corporation, trees that were here before colour television, trees that have provided shade for family picnics for decades is also on the chopping block.”

Native species had originally been thought to have been spared the worst of the beetle, which preferred dutch elms and other

exotics, but Mr Gorman noted that 28 species were now known to be susceptible.

“I’m a measured person who dislikes alarmists, but this borer beetle is a pandemic for Western Australia’s trees. And, as hard as it is, I support the actions to remove the infested trees.

Chainsaw

“Indeed, we need the state and local governments to move as fast as possible.

“I will very happily get my chainsaw out if I need to, because without swift action, WA faces massive economic disruption.”

Mr Gorman said the beetle had cost the US state of California an estimated \$15.9 billion.

But he said there was some hope, with wood movements being banned, while researchers at the University of WA and CSIRO were looking at treatment options.

He also urged Western Australians to learn to identify the beetle and report any damaged trees.

“Fast action and a community response now is the only way to ensure that Perth’s tree canopy is there for the next generation of Western Australians, and that this invasive beetle does not affect the rest of Australia,” he said.

Extreme schemes may seem supreme

Apologies for my theatrical rhyme, but I wanted to one-up the Australian Taxation Office following their recent and somewhat unrhythmic report titled “Before you commit, check it is legit”.

The ATO is sending us all a timely reminder to look out for tax advice that sounds too good to be true.

There’s nothing wrong with the advice and it goes hand in hand with a \$2.1 billion funding boost in the recent federal budget aimed at strengthening tax compliance. \$78 million of this is specifically ear-marked to upgrade ATO technology to detect scammers in real-time, rather than reviewing what happened three or four years ago.

I hope the ATO extracted the advice from their own internal training manual because it should be cutting edge in the wake of a recent tax scheme as big as this country has ever seen.

It’s known as the TikTok GST Fraud Scheme. Inexplicably, over 57,000 people are believed to have participated in it, fleecing the tax office out of \$2 billion. The hack was a simple step by step instruction on how to falsify GST records and claim bogus ATO refunds and was promoted by influencers as a victimless crime.

The ATO, while asleep at the wheel, dished out phoney refunds like Oprah passes

around Pontiacs. “You get a refund and you get a refund... everybody gets a refund”.

There are two very disturbing aspects to this. The first is that the banks were the first to notice the unusual refunds, some as big as \$100,000. The ATO had no idea and proceeded to issue \$850 million in erroneous refunds over a six-month period before finally waking up and forming a taskforce.

The second is that at least 150 ATO officials have been investigated as part of the TikTok GST scheme, resulting in employment terminations and criminal proceedings.

Oprah astutely says ‘turn your wounds into wisdom’. The ATO, inadequate in the art of rhythmic rhyming, but now wiser on the inner workings of tax schemes, has done just that. They offer us sage advice to be alert of warning signs and beware of promoters and advisers who:

- offer zero-risk guarantees for their products
- ask you to maintain secrecy about the arrangement
- charge a fee or commission based on tax saved
- discourage you from getting independent advice
- don’t have a product disclosure statement or prospectus
- offer advice about phoenixing or liquidation of key companies

They also unashamedly ask for your anonymous tip-off should you come across a tax scheme promoter. I can only hope that their funding boost makes their system more slicker so they act a bit quicker when you dob-in that tricker.

Memoir set to stir Freo

Foxed

SHARING your life story through a memoir can be somewhat nerve-wracking, particularly when your insights about your community could make some a little uncomfortable.

First-time Fremantle author Khin Myint's *Fragile Creatures* will almost certainly push buttons when it's launched at the Chesterton Lounge at Bar Orient this coming Friday (June 7), and he admits to having some nerves ahead of the event.

"I feel a mixed set of emotions about that, because it's my local community, and then people will just know so much about my life," Myint says.

The son of a Burmese father and English mother, he grew up in Rossmoyne struggling to fit into either the European community, or its small but growing Asian population.

It was the era of notorious racist Jack van Tongeren, whose firebombing of the Man Lin restaurant in Karawara sparked fear across the city; the son of the Chan family who were the victims of the attack was a fellow Rossmoyne student.

Myint presents a searing account of the terrifying bullying he and others faced during that tense era, and while he says Perth has come a long way, he still sees racism around him.

"Racism in Fremantle is not overt, in my experience as a 40-something, mixed-race guy, but it's definitely there.

"When I want to talk about race, ideas around race or racial identity, I often feel it's not a welcome conversation here."

The book also delves into mental health, with Myint's sister Theda's looming suicide a pervading theme.

His family, the medical establishment and the alternative healers were split on whether her illness was wholly mental or wholly physical, and he says one of the aims of the book is to challenge readers to look at a middle ground.

"I want them to remember in

their own lives, and think about in their own lives, how the culture that we that we live in, that we swim in, defines how we look at the things around us and look at other people, and how there can be a lot of a lack of nuance in how we see other people.

"The culture encourages us to think in stereotypes, to think in binaries - for example, binaries around the illness."

Myint also wants a more critical look at masculinity, arguing that there are contrary notions of how young men

in particular are supposed to behave.

He says it's largely boys and men being pulled towards the right, and he fears that's in part from the left constantly telling them they're the problem.

"As we're critiquing them, I think you need to be compassionate towards that; you need to flow into it and understand what's going on a little bit," he said.

Wilderness Society campaigner Sarah English said climate and biodiversity crises intersected at Bibra Lake.

"As we've seen with the Turtle Trackers, local communities are on the frontlines of the climate and biodiversity crises, and it's essential that they're able to participate in environmental decision-making.

"Community rights must be embedded in our new nature laws."

On Wednesday the Albanese government introduced legislation in the Parliament to establish a national environmental protection agency, promising it would be a "tough cop on the beat".

Environment minister Tanya Plibersek said one of its first tasks would be to investigate illegal land clearing and offsets, following an audit that found one in seven developments could be in breach of their conditions.

Vigil

Also on the cards under new legislation will be a new organisation, Environment Information Australia which will "provide up-to-date, transparent environmental data and information to the public".

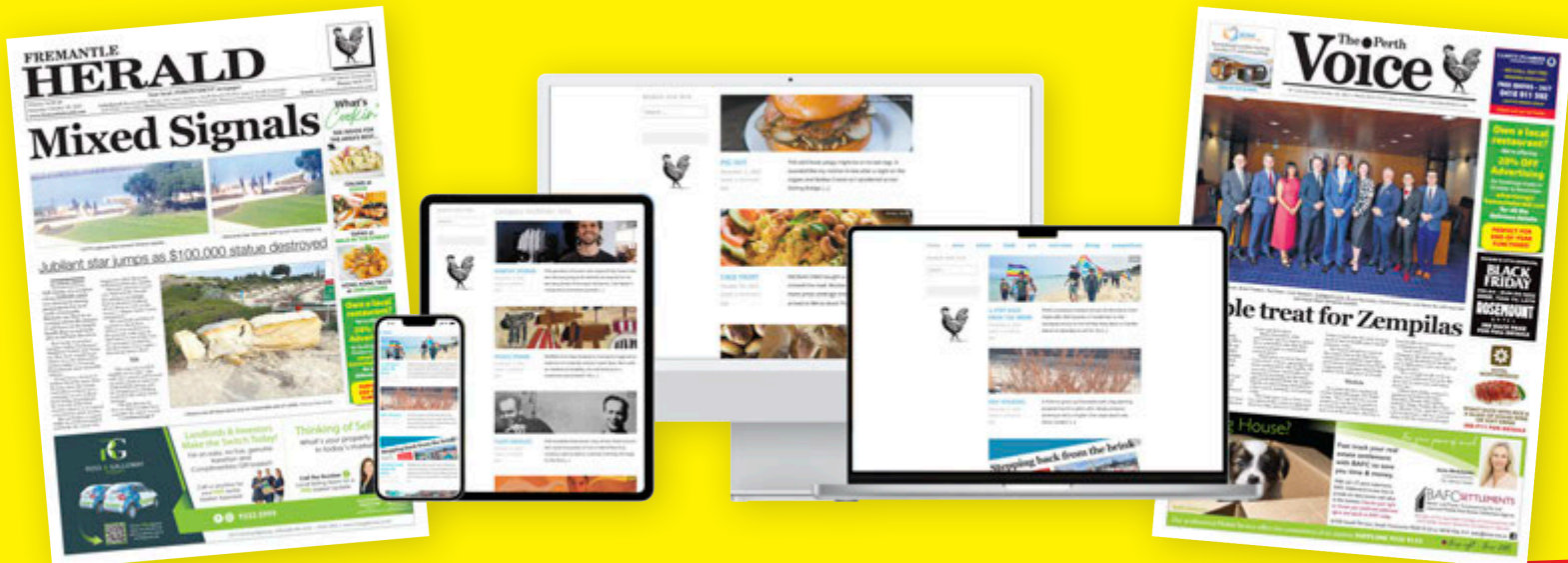
But while the new agencies were welcomed by environmental groups, they say they'll be toothless unless the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act was also overhauled.

The Wilderness Society, Environmental Justice Australia and Conservation Council of WA also want an independent board for the EPA, saying it would otherwise be susceptible to interference from vested interests.

The groups said the legislation didn't give the public a "fair say" in environmental decisions.

Ms English said it was "once-in-a-generation" opportunity to create laws that worked for nature.

"Together, we're calling for a definition of 'unacceptable impacts', strong national environmental standards, and for climate change and deforestation to be addressed in the EPBC Act," Ms English said.

Carriage owner hits out at council

THE owner of the Carriage Cafe in Fremantle's Esplanade Reserve has labelled the actions of Fremantle council "unconscionable" after it demanded the carriage be demolished.

The Cafe, which has been at the Esplanade since the 1970s, was purchased by David Furness in May 2017 and had been operating until he was forced to close in 2022 due to the "immense" financial strain caused by COVID-19.

Mr Furness had planned to sell the Carriage Cafe and says he had a prospective buyer waiting, so began negotiations to secure a five plus five-year lease.

By this point, the business was incurring rent to the City of a "significant amount" which the council agreed to put on hold.

"We had verbal discussions about once the sale will be complete, we would offset what I owed to the council by what I would have received for the purchase for the sale," Mr Furness said.

However, in a meeting with the council later, Mr Furness said the "tone" of discussions turned "sour" after which he attempted to make sure the next owners would not run into the same issues.

"I expressed my opinion to ensure that that person had the right agreement and wasn't going to fall into any complexities down the line," he said.

Lease

The lease, Mr Furness says, included several clauses which he took umbrage with such as a restriction on trading times as well as a reference to a 'tenant' and 'landlord'.

"How can they be the landlord of the property that I own?" Mr Furness said.

"In layman's terms, I own a building and you're claiming to be the landlord of that building.

"It doesn't work like that."

Two weeks after the final meeting, Mr Furness says he received an email from the council instructing him to demolish the cafe.

"It was, 'Get stuffed, David, forget it, we want it gone'."

The carriage is secured to the site with 26 groundings, which Mr Furness says classifies it as a "permanent" structure.

Roots of adjacent Moreton Bay Figs have also grown underneath the cafe, meaning removal "may potentially damage" the heritage-listed trees, he believes.

"Even if it's a removable structure, it's been for in the area for significant period 'for the enjoyment of the land', which is pretty arguable," Mr Furness said.

Mr Furness was told a financial meeting did occur within the council walls to rescind the lease, but alleges he was not made privy to it and was not able to access meeting minutes due to it being a "personal matter" of the council, which had engaged lawyers.

"They have the right not to disclose personal matters," he said.

Surrender

"I asked them to please provide me with a copy of the council meeting minutes where the decision was altered along with the rationale behind it.

"I've been unable to locate the committee meeting minutes discussing this matter, and since then, I've received a number of letters from the lawyers demanding that I surrender the cafe to the council."

The letters cited several reasons including the fact Mr Furness' lease had expired and that he had unpaid amounts owing to the council.

Mr Furness also says the council told him he had "no right to refer the dispute to arbitration" and that he "must make suitable arrangements with the council to collect any plant and equipment" in the Carriage Cafe by close of business on April 19.

"If you fail to do so the council the city will instruct us to commence action under the disposal of uncollected Goods Act 1970," Mr Furness read from a letter.

Mr Furness says he wonders why the council would need the cafe equipment unless it was setting it up for another owner, and in any case, refused to give the cafe up.

"If they want my keys, they should fairly compensate me for the losses I am now facing, that have prevented me from selling my property and business."

Mr Furness says the debacle had taken its toll, and that Council had "moved the goalposts" several times during the negotiations to save the cafe which he says he has not abandoned.

"I'm still wanting to resolve the matter," he said, "and I'm not walking away from it.

"They're just being completely unreasonable, unfair, and deceitful about how they've eluded me over a number of years.

A great opportunity to listen

HANNAH FITZHARDINGE is the mayor of Fremantle.

A LARGE element of my role as the mayor is to talk – to speak at council when we’re making decisions, to do media, to give speeches.

However, the greatest pleasure I’ve had over the past year has in fact been to do the opposite – to listen.

a creative city that is inspiring, diverse and dares to be different; a resilient city that plans for the future and is empowered to take action; and,

an inclusive city that welcomes,

celebrates and cares for all people, cultures and abilities

Now the real work begins.

To ensure this isn’t just a plan that sits on a shelf, a whole body of work has been done within the organisation to align our corporate planning, budgeting, resource allocation and service delivery with the Strategic Community Plan.

At the end of the day, a plan that doesn’t drive decision-making isn’t worth very much.

Perhaps what gives me the most confidence that the plan will drive change in how we do things is the level of engagement employees of the City had in developing it.

Too often this type of work becomes just the job of those tasked with ‘community engagement’, while the people who have to deliver the outcomes are not included in the process.

Not so in Freo!

Involved

Everyone, from our parks team to our arts folks and our engineers, got involved in developing the plan.

In doing so, they heard directly what the community is hoping for in the future.

So now what?

The plan is available on our website and we’d love you to have a look.

It’s a vision that can’t be delivered by council alone.

The enthusiasm shown by the thousands of community members who were part of this process is a reflection of how much we all care about our city.

I’m confident that the Strategic Community Plan truly reflects our collective vision for the next 10 years and provides a clear understanding of what matters most to the people who live, work and play in Fremantle.

I hope you do too.

Strange times

FANCY walking inside a giant eyeball and then down a serpentine tunnel into a glowing brain?

Synapse is just one of the weird arty installations at this year's Strange Festival, which features more than 20 outré artworks in empty shopfronts and neglected spaces across Perth.

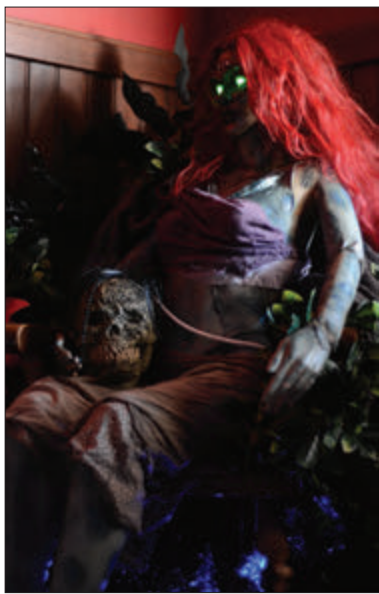
More than 30 artists have been given carte blanche to do what they want for the free art trail with only one stipulation – it has to be odd.

So it's only fitting that opening night kicks off with *The Procession of Enkidu* – an army of drummers carrying a sculpture of the legendary Enkidu (the companion of Mesopotamian demigod Gilgamesh) through the malls of Perth.

Led by the enigmatic Sayer, they weave through the city by torchlight and drum, before ceremoniously laying Enkidu to rest in the beating heart of the city – Forrest Place.

If you're still standing after all that mythological hoopla, you might want to check out some other live events and performances at the festival.

There's Mad Max-inspired fare at the Thunderdome in Yagan Square, a bazaar with trinkets and workshops at "Bartertown" and underground live shows



at Strange Court (the Carillon City Food Court) and Strange Basement (Liberty Basement).

Making a welcome return is Exhumed Cinema at Como Theatre (the old Cygnet and Perth's first 'talkie' picture house) with a line-up of more than 50 cult and classic films in 35mm or 16mm including *Silence of the Lambs*, *Fight Club*, *Dr Strangelove*, *The Goonies* and *Children of Men*.

Now in its third year, the Strange Festival is still decidedly grass-roots and feels like it's flying by the seat of its pants.

Festival co-founder Jess Oakley wouldn't have it any other way.

"What I have learnt from the last two years of Strange... is that it is a dynamic beast which never

turns out how we expect," she says.

"This is not something to be seen as a negative as I have learnt to put trust in our artist to create beautiful installations that fit, fill and complicate the spaces they are given.

"It has reinforced my belief that art is for everyone and what may not speak to you will deeply impact someone else. Which makes it invaluable in a cohesive diverse community.

"Though the biggest thing I have learnt and grown from is

that something this big can't be done alone."

Oakley says one of the highlights of this year's festival is the giant art installation *Synapse* at Elizabeth Quay.


"It's a 20-metre long interactive installation where you are able to enter through the pupil of an eye and walk through a tunnel into the brain," she says.

"There you can interact with objects which describe the anatomy and physiology of the visual system in the mother tongue of Whadjuk Boodjar."

The festival will go out with a bang on closing night with local noise artists Injured Ninja performing *The Epic of Gilgamesh*, a poem written between 2100 and 1200 BC in ancient Mesopotamia.

Get ready for a high-energy primal party as manic drummers create a trance-like groove for the immolation of Enkidu, which Oakley describes as "Mad Max meets Neo-Mesopotamia".

Exotic reunion

EASTWINDS are so multicultural, they make the UN look xenophobic.

The six-piece world-roots band includes musicians from Estonia, Japan, Iran, Australia and England, and they play a mind-boggling array of instruments like the shinobue flute, cittern and daf drum.

The global ensemble was formed in 2013 by three wind players including Fremantle local Mark Cain, who also composes, teaches music and makes instruments from plumbing accessories and recyclable materials.

Cain is a cult legend in the port city and for decades has performed

in a variety of world music bands including Nova Ensemble, Daramad and Flying Carpathians, who won a WAM World Music Award in 2018.

He plays a number of wind instruments, but is perhaps best known for his tasty saxophone licks.

He's also a former radio journalist and trained WA's first indigenous radio broadcasters as part of Noongar Radio at 6NR.

Right now Cain's busy preparing for a special Eastwinds reunion gig in Fremantle.

"Our singer Kristiina Maalaps left for Estonia three years ago and returned earlier this year for a short sojourn, hence our reunion gig," he says.

"Kristiina is a sublime singer, fluent in the languages of jazz and folk... and with the voice of

a songbird. The tune I most like in our repertoire is *The Gift* – it features a counter vocal melody written by Kristiina, with lyrics written by her poet mother Lea Tabur."

Cain says the mix of cultures and instruments in Eastwinds, plus their love of improv, creates a very unique sound.

"Esfandiar Shahmir plays the Persian ney, an end-blown flute with an ethereal, haunting sound," he says. "He is also a master percussionist on a large frame drum called daf."

"Sanshi hails from Japan and is a didgeridoo virtuoso who refined his skills learning from the Yolngu in N.E. Arnhem Land."

"Other instruments featured include saxophones, shawms, jaw harp, home-made reed instruments, shinobue flute and also guitar,

cittern and double bass (Steve and Kieran Barnes)."

In-between gigs, a stripped down Eastwinds tour schools across Australia as part of the Musica Viva educational program.

Cain says it's highly rewarding that pupils get to see a band with no cultural barriers, "where anything is possible".

He especially enjoyed visiting a small farming community school in Bedgerabong, NSW.

"After the show the students asked if they could perform a couple of pieces for us featuring about a dozen classroom marimbas (built some years before in a community project with composer/community artist John Madden)," he says.

"It should be borne in mind that this school had no qualified music teacher, just passionate educators willing to rehearse the students daily. What they played was jaw-dropping."

"The arrangement, the phrasing, the tremolo rolls with their mallets and just the togetherness of their playing. It was beautiful. This is what inspires us. To see music in out-of-the-way places played to this standard and with such joy, you can't beat that!"

Nearer to home, Cain says

the closure of Kulcha in 2014 – a permanent venue for live world music in Fremantle – left a "huge hole" in the local music scene.

"It was such a short-sighted government funding decision and it was a real loss to Fremantle," he says.

"There are signs of things getting better. The ongoing Multicultural Cafe series, which not usually the held in Fremantle, has breathed some much-needed life into this space and given opportunities to emerging musicians of different background."

With wars raging across the world, Cain says Eastwinds is a reminder that music can transcend religion and politics to be a unifying force: "This band bridges cultural divides and we think the group points to a direction in how Australian music will evolve in decades to come. Multiculturalism is definitely alive and well here. And in tenuous times, this is a real plus in Australia."

With the rare occurrence of all six members in WA, Eastwinds will play a special reunion gig at Fremantle Park Club, 36 Ellen Street on Saturday June 29 at 7:30pm. Tix at trybooking.com/events/landing/1219804.

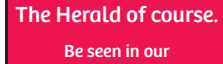

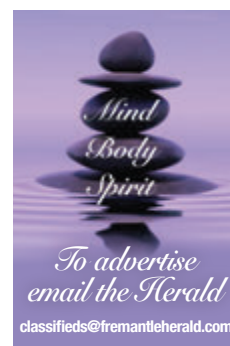

Never too late

If you're of a certain vintage, where do you go to make new friends or find romance?

Dating apps can be intimidating and the quality of candidates patchy to say the least – some look like extras from *Night of the Living Dead* – match-making agencies are expensive, and if you don't belong to any clubs or societies, opportunities to socialise can be fleeting.

This can leave older people feeling lonely and isolated with no knight in shining armour on the horizon (for the record it could be a female knight, see Brienne of Tarth in *Game of Thrones*)

Freo local Sarah Booth decided to address this dating void by holding a casual, monthly mingler for singles aged 60 or over at the Ode to Sirens pub in the heart of Fremantle.

Older folk will probably feel at home as the walls are lined with classic LP covers.

"The idea came for the event when my smart, funny, wonderful 75-year-old neighbour Mary needed to find a partner," Booth says. "She didn't have much success on the apps – and I don't blame her – so I decided to start a whole event for her, and all the other 60-plus singles in Freo, instead."

"Ode to Sirens I love because it

is a cool place, nicely lit, cosy and relaxing – the perfect environment for a mingle."

Booth says the debut event in April attracted a "really nice crowd" and moving forward she hopes to hold it on the last Thursday of every month.

"The event is very casual and low key, everyone gets a name tag on arrival and then can just buy a drink and have a chat," she says.

"The last event attracted a really nice crowd, so it wasn't too nerve wracking for anyone."

So what are the chances of finding your dream partner later in life? A study from the University of Bath revealed the odds of finding love after 60 are 1 in 562 – but only if you leave your chances to fate.

If you are proactive and take steps to socialise and meet new people, the odds dramatically reduce.

Call the *Chook* soppy and sentimental, but we believe it's a bit of both – fate and effort – and if you don't buy a ticket to the raffle, you ain't going to win.

There are apps and online dating sites for older folk including Silver Singles, Singles 50 and Mature Dating, but Booth says there is no substitute for a socialiser where things happen naturally and are less force-fed.

"I don't believe apps for any

age group can replace the feeling of face-to-face connection," she says.

"That's not even old school, it's just chemistry! What I wanted to create was a place that people felt comfortable and safe getting to know others in the Fremantle community – whether it's romance or friendship it's a great opportunity just to connect and have fun."

In a recent interview with the *Herald*, 82-year-old Freo resident Sandra Ramini-Harris – whose

illustrious broadcasting career included interviewing John Lennon and Yoko One during their peace lie-in – says older people need to embrace the third act of their life, and advocates for a positive shift in perspective on ageing.

She says many have fallen for the 'young is everything' message of mass media. She criticises the trend of cosmetic procedures aimed at reversing the ageing process, advocating for authenticity and embracing the beauty that comes

with age – grey hair and wrinkles.

Ramini-Harris also rejects the notion that merely existing is a worthwhile goal.

She wants to live life fully, savouring every moment, experiencing new adventures, and cherishing milestones like witnessing grandchildren flourish, and says others should do the same.

The next 60-plus Encore event is scheduled for Thursday June 27 at Ode to Sirens, 25 High Street in Fremantle.

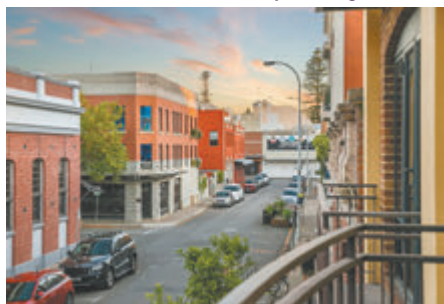

It's a sellers' market. Property listings throughout the metropolitan area are down to about 2,400 on reiwa.com. Four years ago, there were 14,000 properties on offer. Sales volumes are consistently at around 950 per week, outpacing supply so buyers often find themselves making an offer to purchase in competition with others.

Agents have differing approaches as to how to deal with multiple offers but normally will inform buyers that their offer is one amongst others. When a property is offered for sale by private treaty, details of competing buyers' offers are not normally revealed so as a buyer offering in competition with others, it is difficult to know what price and conditions will ensure purchasing success without paying significantly more than the next highest offer. This is made more difficult given most properties no longer carry an obvious price tag.

should not assume the agent thinks it is a lie

Buyers should remember that agents have a responsibility to act in the best interests of the seller unless it is unlawful or unethical to do so. Agents have a legal responsibility to work at getting the buyer to pay the highest possible price on terms favourable to the seller they represent.

One of the most effective ways to achieve this and discharge their fiduciary responsibility is to have multiple purchasers competing to buy. Naturally, buyers don't like having to compete as it is much harder to gain a negotiable advantage in such circumstances.

My advice to buyers is to always ask the agent if there are any other current offers on the property before submitting your own offer. Agents are not obliged to tell you that there are, so this knowledge might influence your initial offer.

Also, consider removing any less-essential conditions of your offer such a timber pest inspection clause if one had been done recently, especially for more modern homes and consider aligning the settlement date to suit the seller. A bigger deposit might make your offer more appealing or an 'odd' price offering rather than neat 5 or 10-thousand increment might make your offer stand out from the others.

The notion that agents should assume the buyer's first offer is not their "best offer" is nonsense. A buyer who tells the agent that this is their best offer should not assume the agent thinks it is a lie and remember that the seller is under no obligation to provide you an opportunity to negotiate further.

Buyers who miss out through competition are naturally disappointed, but ought to come away from the experience knowing they gave it their best shot.
